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eadership Team

The expanded Leadership team has continued its work. This past year Philippe Aussel was welcomed to the team as Deputy People's Warden. Continuing as wardens were Susan Winn, Ann Cumyn and Jimmie Skerget. The team includes Kevin Glasgow as Treasurer, Gerry Zampini as Parish Council Chair and Richard Howarth as minute taker.



Many things were accomplished during this year;

however the building continues to require necessary and cosmetic attention. Regarding the latter, an anonymous donation has been received to improve the men's and women's washrooms. The work is being carried out as this report is being written. From the outside, the church now looks cared for and welcoming. There is still work required within the tower and the flat roof over the office entrance needs to be redone.

A request for a grant to install washrooms for the handicapped was submitted to the Federal Government. Unfortunately it was not granted. We were unable to include an elevator or other type of access as the grant for which we applied had a maximum of \$75,000. The next round of Government monies available was for large projects with a minimum of \$500,000! It is expected that there will be a future opportunity to apply for a grant that will enable us to put in both washrooms for the handicapped and an elevator. The design of the stairs makes them completely unsuitable for chair lifts.

The leadership team has found time to review our mission and activities. Last spring we had a Parish Day facilitated by the Rev. Eleanor Caruana, incumbent of St James, Hudson. During this day we looked at our talents and how they fitted the various aspects of our parish life. We were reminded that enthusiastic church members were essential for things to happen.

Neil, Sue and Ann attended a stewardship workshop put on by the Diocese in October. Among the interesting ideas presented were the use of a narrative budget, the concept that members of a church should work towards giving 2% of their net income (that is income after all deductions) and the possibility of giving through pre-authorized deductions. The leadership team believes that these ideas should be part of the discussion for the next stewardship campaign.

The team would like to thank Sue, Ann and Philippe who are stepping down; we know they will still be around to help where needed.

Lenten Lunches

are held at Christ Church, Beaurepaire on the six consecutive Wednesdays in Lent. They are served from 11.30 a.m. to 1.00 p.m.

St George's is responsible for the lunch on 30 March this year; I hope you will come and have lunch with us. Or perhaps treat a friend to lunch on any Wednesday in Lent.

A hearty soup, bread-roll, cheese, dessert, coffee or tea are served. The cost is \$7.00.

All proceeds go to the PWRDF: a very worthwhile cause. Last year almost \$4,000 was raised by the five churches involved. It is a pleasant and easy way to reach out and increase our commitment to Mission.

As with all fundraising, success is not achieved alone; involvement by the Parish is essential. It really isn't a lot of work and many hands make the work easier and fun. With this in mind I will be asking for help; the opportunities are included below.

Lent 2011

Dear Friends.

As we approach Lent for another year, we are reminded that our Christian lives have different seasons, each of which take on different characters. Christmas and Easter are times of joy and praise, Advent a time of expectation. Lent is an opportunity to truthfully look at our lives in relation to God. It is a deeply personal time, in which each one of us takes ourselves aside, into a quiet place, to be with God. Chapter 49 of the Rule of St

Benedict (my favourite book by my favourite author) focuses on Lenten observance. It begins-


Although the life of a monk ought to have about it at all times the character of a Lenten observance, yet since few have the virtue for that, we therefore urge that during the actual days of Lent the brethren keep their lives most pure and at the same time wash away during these holy days all the negligences of other times.


Lent is an opportunity for us to re-examine our lives and think about those un-Christ-like behaviours we surrender to. Habit can be a great force for good or ill, and Lent offers a chance to shed bad habits and form good ones. St Benedict also says-

During these days, therefore, let us increase somewhat the usual burden of our service, as by private prayers and by abstinence in food and drink. Thus everyone of his own will may offer God "with joy of the Holy Spirit" (1 Thess. 1:6) something above the measure required of him.

Notice the words 'offer' and 'joy'. Lent is not a miserable season where we do without things in a trade off with God. Lent is a season when we give ourselves as a more perfect gift to the One whom we love and who has given Himself to us, a ransom for many.
